HYMNS AND HYMN singing express the Christian faith in a way that is tangible, immediate, powerful and appealing. They serve as an outline of our theology, a narrative of the life and ministry of Jesus, a recounting of the deeds of Christ's followers, and as an invitation to the corporate worship of God.

Most importantly, hymns call us to service - to go out and be the church in the world. Hymns lift us out of ourselves and into a place where the presence of God is truly felt, a transcendence that leads to transformation.

This is a truth known and held by hymn writers throughout the ages - from the Latin and Greek writers of the early church, through Thomas Aquinas, Martin Luther, Isaac Watts, the Wesleys, and John Mason Neale, to the authors and composers of our own time.

Tonight's Festival offers hymns from the great riches of the church's musical and literary tradition. We will begin and end with a hymn of praise to God. In between we will embark on a journey through the liturgical year, from Advent through Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Holy Week, Easter, Pentecost, and Trinity.

The arrangements of these hymns - for brass, percussion, choir, organ and congregation - are intended to heighten and intensify both texts and tunes. The instrumental writing exploits the spacious acoustics of this magnificent church. The brilliance of the brass enhances the grandeur of this glorious organ. Timpani punctuate the drama. The stanzas arranged for the choirs highlight the texts and musical lines in new and different ways.

All of you are invited to join in singing these hymns in the manner set forth by John Wesley in his *Select Hymns*, 1761. May you leave here renewed and transformed.

Directions for Singing

- I. Learn these tunes before you learn any others; afterwards learn as many as you please.
- II. Sing them exactly as they are printed here, without altering or mending them as all; and if you have learned to sing them otherwise, unlearn it as soon as you can.
- III. Sing all. See that you join with the congregation as frequently as you can. Let not a slight degree of weakness or weariness hinder you. If it is a cross to you, take it up, and you will find it a blessing.
- IV. Sing lustily and with a good courage. Beware of singing as if you were half dead, or half asleep; but lift up your voice with strength. Be no more afraid of your voice now, nor more ashamed of its being heard, than when you sung the songs of Satan.
- V. Sing modestly. Do not bawl, so as to be heard above or distinct from the rest of the congregation, that you may not destroy the harmony; but strive to unite your voices together, so as to make one clear melodious sound.
- VI. Singe in time. Whatever time is sung be sure to keep with it. Do not run before nor stay behind it; but attend close to the leading voices, and move therewith as exactly as you can; and take care not to sing too slow. This drawling way naturally steals on all who are lazy; and it is high time to drive it out from us, and sing all our tunes just as quick as we did at first.
- VII. Above all sing spiritually. Have an eye to God in every word you sing. Aim at pleasing him more than yourself, or any other creature. In order to do this attend strictly to the sense of what you sing, and see that your heart is not carried away with the sound, but offered to God continually; so shall your singing be such as the Lord will approve here, and reward you when he cometh in the clouds of heaven.



RICHARD WEBSTER



Composer, church musician, conductor and organist -- Richard Webster is currently Lecturer in the Institute of Sacred Music (ISM) at Yale University. He retired in 2022 as Director of Music and Organist at Trinity Church, Copley Square, Boston after 17 years. During 2023-24 he served as Interim Director of Music at St. Paul's Choir School, Harvard Square, Cambridge, Massachusetts.

As a composer and arranger he completes several commissioned works a year. His hymn arrangements for brass, percussion, organ and congregation are heard across the world, including the CBC's Christmas and Easter broadcasts, BBC's "Songs of Praise," at a hymn festival in Sweden's Lund Cathedral, in an Australian celebration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation and on a recording of hymns from Taiwan.

At Trinity, Boston, where he cofounded the Trinity Choristers, he led the choirs on five tours of England, with residencies at York Minster; Westminster Abbey; Durham, Ely, Lincoln, Chichester, Salisbury, Wells, Winchester and St. Paul's Cathedrals. During his tenure, Trinity's 1926 Skinner nave organ was successfully renovated and a new 4-manual Skinner replica console added.

Richard is Music Director of Chicago's "Bach in the City," a new endeavor at St. Vincent DePaul Church, and the successor to Bach Week Festival that he had directed for 50 years, based in Evanston. Sought after as a choral clinician, he has led choir courses and workshops across the U.S., South Africa and New Zealand. He is an honorary Fellow of the Royal School of Church Music (FRSCM), and holds the Doctor of Music degree, honoris causa, from the University of the South at Sewanee.

Webster has performed and recorded as organist with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra in works from the Saint-Saens Organ Symphony to Ives' Fourth Symphony. He is the Organist and Choirmaster Emeritus of St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Evanston, Illinois, where, from 1974 to 2003 he directed the Choir of Men and Boys, the Girls Choir, Schola and the St. Luke's Singers in a program widely respected and emulated. The restoration of the celebrated 1922 Ernest M. Skinner organ, Opus 327 at St. Luke's was accomplished under his leadership.

A native of Nashville, Mr. Webster studied organ with Peter Fyfe, Karel Paukert and Wolfgang Rübsam. He was a Fulbright Scholar to Great Britain, as Organ Scholar at Chichester Cathedral under John Birch.

Webster's works are published by Augsburg Fortress, Church Music Society, Church Publishing, Selah and Advent Press. His articles on church music have appeared in The American Organist, The Diapason, Chicago Tribune, The Living Church, Journal of the Association of Anglican Musicians, the Choral Journal of the ACDA and the Windy City Times. He was a contributing author to Leading the Church's Song, published by Augsburg.

A passionate runner, Richard has completed 48 marathons, including 21 Boston Marathons.

CHOIR OF THE CATHEDRAL OF ST. PHILIP



The Cathedral of St. Philip Choir is comprised of 35 auditioned volunteers and 15 staff singers, the core of which makes up its chamber ensemble, the Cathedral Schola. Between them, they provide musical leadership for more than 150 choral services per year, including weekly Sunday afternoon Evensongs or Choral Eucharists from September to May; lessons & carol services for Advent, Christmas, and the Passion; a liturgical Requiem eucharist with orchestra on All Saints' Sunday afternoon; and occasional large-scale sacred masterworks with orchestra. Together they have recorded three discs for Gothic Records: Into the House and Gate of Heaven features music for the Feast of All Saints; American Canticle – which was a Critics Award recipient in the American Record Guide; and Tidings of Comfort & Joy: Christmas

at the Cathedral of St. Philip, Atlanta, which also features members of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra brass, flute, and percussion sections.

The Cathedral Choir or Schola collaborate with the Atlanta Baroque Orchestra annually, and have served as choir-in-residence at many of the great houses of worship in England, including St. Paul's Cathedral, Westminster Abbey, York Minster; the cathedrals in Canterbury, Durham, and Salisbury; and at St. Patrick's Cathedral in Dublin, Ireland; and they have accepted residencies at Canterbury and Winchester cathedrals during July 2027.

Since 2009 they have been under the direction of Dale Adelmann, Canon for Music; and the choirs also enjoy the brilliant support of Chase Loomer, Organist & Associate Choirmaster; Nolan Anthony, Intern in Church Music; and Timothy Gunter, administrative Coordinator for Music.

THE GEORGIA BOY CHOIR



Established in 2009 under the baton of Artistic Director and Conductor David R. White, the Georgia Boy Choir (Peachtree Road's Ensemble-in-Residence) has earned a reputation as one of the finest ensembles of its kind. Known for the transcendent beauty of its sound and the depth of its musical interpretation, the Choir has reached millions of listeners worldwide through live performances and its acclaimed YouTube channel, with views from more than 100 countries.

Operating on a five-tier music education system, the Choir provides comprehensive training in vocal technique, musicianship, and character development to boys and young men from across metropolitan Atlanta. The Georgia Boy Choir has performed throughout the United States and

internationally in cathedrals, concert halls, and cultural landmarks across China, England, Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Estonia, Spain, Portugal, Scotland, Ireland, France, Belgium, Italy, Germany, Iceland, Austria, the Czech Republic, and the United States. Recognizing that a musician's first instrument is himself, the Choir emphasizes personal growth alongside musical excellence. Each rehearsal reinforces the Choir's motto, "Be the Best Boy You Can Be," cultivating self-discipline, respect, and joy in artistic expression. Through this transformative approach, the Georgia Boy Choir continues to shape not only exceptional musicians but also men of integrity, purpose, and beauty.

THE CHANCEL CHOIR OF PEACHTREE ROAD UNITED METHODIST CHURCH



The Chancel Choir of Peachtree Road United Methodist Church is made up of approximately sixty volunteer and nine professional singers. Also within the choir are the Chamber Singers, a group of sixteen auditioned voices that concentrate on music of the Renaissance. They provide musical leadership for all weekly worship services as well as for choral services including All Saints Evensong, Lessons and Carols for Advent, Christmas, and Lenten services.

The music program at Peachtree Road United Methodist Church includes a full-scale concert series which draws music lovers from across the city. The series includes at least two major choral works by the Chancel Choir each season with members of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra. Performances include Bach's Johannes Passion, Brahm's Requiem, Mendelssohn's Elijah, Mozart's Requiem,

Poulenc's Gloria, Faure Requiem as well as several major mass settings of Haydn and Mozart. Under the baton of Robert Spano in 2002, the choir appeared with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra performing Concerto for Organ, Orchestra, and Chorus by Stephen Paulus.

In the United States, the choir has appeared at Carnegie Hall, the National Cathedral in Washington D.C., and the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City. The Peachtree Road Choir has toured internationally for many years. Notably, the choir has appeared and Notre Dame, Chartres, Reims Cathedral in France and at St. Paul's, Wells Cathedral and Westminster Abbey in the United Kingdom. In August 2026, the choir will be in residence at Canterbury Cathedral, UK. They also performed benefit concerts at St. Mary's Anglican Church in Killarney and Fota House & Camp; Gardens in County Cork.

Scott Atchison has been the Director of Music and Organist since 1982. The choirs are also supported by newly appointed Associate Organist and Choirmaster, Oak Martin, Assistant Organist, Robin Hensley and Ruth Sommerville, Music and Arts Coordinator.
